



Knitted Coin Boots

As part of the fundraising activity, we are appealing for people to knit the pattern shown below. These are coin boots that we would like to carry out activity with later in the year. Using any spare wool that you might have, please knit as many boots as possible and hand them in to Marianne Sankey, Meg Sankey or Karen Wood.

Using no.8 (4mm) needles cast on 24 sts

Purl 1 row

Next row: K2, (inc K wise into next st, K 1) to last 2 sts, K2 = 34 sts

Beginning with a P row, work 9 rows

Shape top of foot:

1st row - K13, (K2 tog) 4 times, K13 = 30 sts

2nd and every following alternate row Purl

3rd row - K11, (K2 tog) 4 times, K11 = 26 sts

5th row – K9, K2 tog, 4 times, K9 = 22 sts

7th row – K7 (K2 tog), 4 times, K7 = 18 sts

Next row purl

Work 10 rows in st st

Next row - K1 (WFD K2 tog) to last st, K1

Knit 3 rows then cast off

This service will be provided at a cost of £1 per item or 50p per item if you provide your own wrapping paper. This will run until Sunday 22nd December.





Research on Markinch Parish Church 2013/14


What do we know? During 2013, the Church Sub-Committee of Markinch Heritage Group has concentrated upon the use of Session Records and Heritors' Minutes to date the north and south walls of the church. A construction date has been determined for the north wall, but work still remains to fix a date for the I7th/18th century south wall. It is also not clear how much or how little was removed from under the kirk when it was substantially altered in the 1600s. There is pre-Reformation evidence of a richly decorated family tomb belonging to the Beaton (Bethune) family and there may be traces of other burials.


Revealing the old kirk. A recent resistivity survey in the church yard carried out by Dr Oliver O'Grady and measurements of the tower undertaken by RCAHMS will be followed up with radar work under the main place of worship and careful removal of 19th century plasterwork and rotting timber around the great arch on the ground level of the tower. An outline of the shape and size of the 12th century nave and chancel which is beginning to emerge will be tested further using non-invasive equipment.

What do we hope to find? The current work will also seek further information on any pre-Romanesque building, with further work in the churchyard and under the present day church building. Reports on excavations connected with renovations in the 1880s refer to a possible early carved stone and a watching brief will be kept for this and other signs of the site's early use as a place of worship.

Current and future work is being financed by the Living Lomonds Landscape Partnership drawing upon Heritage Lottery Funding, as well as generous contributions from the Hunter Archaeological Trust and the Community Fund of Fife Council.

The pictures above show some of the findings from the resistive measurements performed recently in the churchyard. As we went to print with this newsletter, Dr O'Grady and members of MHG had just completed two days of investigations in the church sanctuary and vestibule using a ground-penetrating radar system. We hope to let you know their findings in a future copy of the newsletter.

Book Reviews - Fact and Fiction


Twelve Days On The Somme by Sidney Rogerson.

The Great War lasted from 1914 to 1918, and, with the Centenary of its outbreak being commemorated next year, there are already many books on the topic, and more still to be published.

Sidney Rogerson went to the Somme, in France, in November 1916, and this book is his story of his twelve days there, towards the end of that battle.

The Battle of the Somme began on July 1, 1916, and lasted until November, 1916, with British casualty lists that affected almost every town and village in the land, largely due to the 'Pals Battalions' of the British Army.

Sidney went in November, with his West Yorkshire Regiment, serving as an Officer in the muddy trenches on that part of Western Front, and met up with various other Regiments and nationalities there.



For me this was a very informative read, some two hours of interesting memoirs from life in the trenches during a brief episode of the Great War.

I was helped by having just returned from the Somme the week before I read the book, so I could identify readily with places such as Fricourt, Peronne, Thiepval and La Boisselle.

Anyone interested in what it was like to be an ordinary soldier in the trenches during the Great War will find this an interesting and informative read.



Lee Child - Gone Tomorrow

Jack Reacher, age 43, is a superhero of Lee Child's fertile imagination. He is six feet five inches tall, weighs between 16 - 18 stones and has a fifty inch chest. Reacher had an army career as a military policeman. Made redundant, he left the service while holding the rank of Major and being awarded several medals for bravery. Reacher has excellent levels of fitness without the need to exercise, eats junk food and drinks copious quantities of black coffee.

Reacher is in a New York subway carriage when he sees a woman acting in the tell-tale manner [to an ex-military policeman] of a suicide bomber. She is Susan Mark, an employee in the Human Resources Unit of the Pentagon. Susan shoots herself and Reacher needs to find out why.

Susan Mark's brother is a serving New York policeman. Her son Peter was kidnapped and killed by the female leader of a terrorist cell. Reacher is chased by Government agents, members of the same terrorist cell and becomes involved with John Sansom, an ex-military man who is looking to be elected to the U.S. Senate. During a covert U.S. operation against the Russian invaders in Afghanistan in March 1983 Sansom was photographed with a young revolutionary named Osama Bin Laden. Sansom needs to ensure that photograph does not reach the public domain.

JUST A COMMON SOLDIER (A Soldier Died Today)

And tho' sometimes, to his neighbours, his tales became a joke, All his Legion buddies listened, for they knew whereof he spoke. But we'll hear his tales no longer for old Bill has passed away, And the world's a little poorer, for a soldier died today.

He will not be mourned by many, just his children and his wife,

Although he has written many poems, Larry Vaincourt is best known for this moving poem, which has been reprinted thousands of times worldwide, including publications in Canada, the U.S., Britain, Australia, New Zealand, India, South Africa and Singapore.

For years the poem has been broadcast nationally every Memorial Day on American radio.

The American Legion has posted it throughout their many branches, the Australian Legion included it in their video tribute, Victory in the Pacific, and it was a central part of the 2009 Royal British Legion Poppy Appeal. In 2008 it was carved into marble for an American Veteran's Memorial.

Territorial Army Becomes Army Reserve

You may not be aware but the Army is going through a period of change. The Territorial Army is becoming the Army Reserve and increasing in size. As a result we are scaling up and are looking for more new recruits than ever!

231 Evacuation Squadron in Glenrothes is part of 225 Medical Regiment and is looking for local people who would like to make a difference and who are willing to make a part-time commitment whilst learning and developing their skill set and knowledge base.

The Army Reserve attracts all sorts of types of people. 231 Evacuation Squadron has Bus Drivers, Engineers, Nurses, Labourers, Security Personnel, Shop Assistants, Scientists, Clinical Professionals, Students and unemployed personnel to name but a few. They come from a wide range of personal circumstances too, including mums, dads, married, single etc.

People mainly join the Army Reserve because they want to do something a bit different with their spare time and they want to play a part in providing national security at a local level. They want a challenge and to learn new skills whilst gaining qualifications. They want to meet new people and spend time with like-minded individuals.

The majority of Army Reservists get a great deal of satisfaction out of their service. This is evident when they complete a training course of gain good results for their efforts. It is very rewarding job, especially when you interact with the community or help in humanitarian missions. They also travel a great deal, whether it is Kenya delivering medical aid to the community or Austria representing the regiment at the Army Snowboarding championships.
